

If you hear transphobia at a game, challenge it or report it!

TRANSPHOBIC CHANTING AND

**BEHAVIOUR** 

If you know a trans fan who is nervous about attending a game you could offer to go with them to support them

Find out from your club
what they are doing to
support trans people so
you are aware of the club's
position and actions.

If you are part of a supporters' group you could approach your club for free or subsidised tickets to help bring trans people along to their first game or back to the game

## WELCOMING TRANS PEOPLE IN FOOTBALL A GUIDE FOR CLUBS



- If your club has stewards,
  hold a briefing about how
  to recognise and take action
  against transphobia
- Clearly signpost and promote your club's reporting system, if anyone witnesses any transphobic language or actions
- Put posters up in the ground stating your support for individuals of all gender identities and expressions.



**Educate your fans** - bring them on the journey with you so they are fully engaged in supporting trans people. Print articles in your club programmes, put a story on your website, have regular tannoy announcements and hold events on match days or non-match days so show your support for trans people at your club

### A GUIDE FOR COACHES



Use gender neutral words until you are sure of someone's pronouns (She/her, He/Him, They/Them)

Just ask!

Rather than say "Well played girls" or "Come on lads", consider saying "team" "everyone" or "folks"

Go team!

Provide the option of alternatives to gendered changing facilities/ toilets for transgender players

Know your FA policy on trans inclusion. When to apply it & when it isn't necessary



Check your teammates'

Just ask!

Challenge transphobia on or off pitch if you can. If you don't feel safe/confident at the time, always make sure you make a report to your club/league/County or Regional FA.

Transphobia is against the laws of The Game.

TRANSPHOBIC

Treat all your team mates the same regardless of their gender identity

Do not ask intrusive questions about a teammate's gender identity or sex assigned at birth

Make sure trans players feel included in all activities. A trans person might avoid gendered activities because they are not sure how people will see them.

Make changing rooms and toilets a safe environment by treating trans players the same way you would anyone else, and make sure that you respect their privacy

Support transgender people on and off the pitch by challenging or reporting any transphobia you have witnessed. Always make sure that transphobic incidents are reported to your Local FA/League/National FA to ensure an investigation can take place. These incidents should be taken as seriously as any other discrimination

### How to identify transphobic language:


- If someone is questioning the gender of another player
- if someone is using words like 'tranny', 'shemale', 'he-she' or 'it'
- If someone is intentionally misgendering another player
- Jokes or banter that perpetuate stereotypes about trans people
- Inappropriate questions or comments about transgender peoples identity or sex assigned at birth e.g. 'aren't you actually a woman/man'

But it's just banter?


It is not your job to determine a player's gender.

The FA have a Trans Inclusion Policy, which should be referred to and they will support applications confidentially. Once a player has been given dispensation, they are permitted to play and should not be barred from doing so.

#### WELCOMING TRANS PEOPLE IN FOOTBALL A GUIDE FOR CLUB SECRETARIES




- Work with your Welfare Officer at the club to provide support for transgender individuals
- Always maintain anonymity about an individual's gender history
- Use your social media account to recognise trans awareness dates, including Trans Day of Visibility, Trans Day of Remembrance, IDOHOBIT. You can also amplify the voices of any trans or non binary people at your club if they are comfortable sharing their story
  - Get involved with the Football v Transphobia Week of Action and show your active support!



Ensure Safeguarding Policies are up to date, Complaints Procedure is in place and you've clearly signposted how to report incidents of bullying or discrimination Ensure these are known by the transgender individual

- Publish the Trans Policy on your website and highlight your inclusivity as a club for people of all genders. This gives people confidence to approach and get involved with your club
- Host training at your club for coaches, players, parents, fans, volunteers and the committee about trans inclusion in football

## WELCOMING TRANS PEOPLE IN FOOTBALL A GUIDE FOR COUNTY FAS



FOOTBALL FOR EVERYONE

These guidelines currently only apply to the English FA

- Officer or Inclusion Officer should lead in supporting trans people.
  The FA can support the CFA, but there are also organisations such as Football v Homophobia who have the expertise to provide guidance
- Work with the Welfare
  Officer at clubs to increase
  their understanding of
  the barriers faced by trans
  individuals
- Work with adult clubs and leagues to provide bespoke support for including players, remembering that each individual has different needs. Some trans people will need more support than others and some trans people will be more open about their identity than others

- Work with the Welfare Officer on Youth
  League Committees to ensure trans players are
  included in league competitions, as mixed football
  is sanctioned up until the age of 18
  - Educate the CFA staff, Board, Council and volunteers about gender identities and expression, the FA's Policy, the barriers trans people face to participation, the importance of trans inclusion
    - Remember that under the FA's Trans
      Inclusion Policy, gender identity
      should not be a barrier to
      participation, therefore CFAs should be doing all
      work possible to ensure people can participate in
      a space that feels comfortable
    - Ensure confidentiality when supporting trans individuals.

      A person's trans history should not be disclosed unless by the individual themselves
- Remember that there will already be trans/non-binary coaches, referees, volunteers, parents and fans participating, but they have not made themselves visible



### WELCOMING TRANS PEOPLE IN FOOTBALL A GUIDE FOR MEDIA



Listen to and include trans voices. Lived experience counts - it's even better if someone who's trans is involved in creating the content

Don't enquire about or refer to someone's deadname (names a trans person may have been known by in the past which they no longer use)



Don't ask inappropriate or intrusive questions. If private information is in any way pertinent, the interviewee(s) will offer it - speculation is also harmful

Study football-specific policies to guide reporting. Questions of eligibility will be answered in these documents; policies evolve so be sure you have the latest versions

Fact check thoroughly.

Misinformation and
misconceptions are rife.

Watch out for 'sweeping
statements', views presented as 'common sense', and research that does not stand up to scrutiny

Be responsible. Your reporting will make trans people in football more visible - consider likely reactions.

Image selection, headlines, and social media posts can all have lasting consequences
